ART IN FOCUS – A Different Approach to Art 9:30-10:45 a.m. Presenter: Michael J. Kaplan, J.D. (ZOOM CLASS ONLY)

The Middle East at War – Who are the Players and What are They Playing for?

11:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Presenter: Peter Haas, Ph.D. The Middle East is constantly engaged in civil wars and regional conflicts that threaten to erupt into more full-scale wars. Although many of the underlying tensions go back centuries, the shape of the current crises grew out of the fall of the Ottoman Empire and the dissolution of the Islamic caliphate in the 1920s. To understand what has happened in the last 100 years, it is important to see what each community sees in the current situation as its most existential threats. To this end, the course will look at the religious and political aspirations of such players as Iran, Saudi Arabia, Hezbollah, Hamas, and the PLO.

We will look at defunct area amusement parks that exist only in our hearts and memories: Euclid Beach Park, Chippewa Lake Park, Geauga Lake Park, and Puritas Springs Park. We will also cover the Richfield Coliseum, Front Row Theater, and Cleveland Arena. And we will take a look at vintage commercials and cartoons. Prizes and a few surprises!

Goodbye to All That: Literature of the First World War by Those who Experienced It

12:45-2:15 p.m. Presenter: Laura Blunk, Ph.D. More of a history class than a literature class, this course will focus on the writings and experiences of people who lives through, fought in, and served in World War One rather than on literary works or tropes. For obvious reasons, we will concentrate on English writers such as Rupert Brooke, Wilfred Owen, Siegfried Sassoon (yes, he's English), Robert Graves, J.R.R. Tolkien, and Americans such as John DosPassos, Jesse Redmon, and Ernest Hemingway. French (Henri Barbusse and Romain Rolland, Germany (the feud between Thomas Mann and his brother Heinrich, Italian, and Russian works will also be considered.

Do We Recite It or Sing It?

12:45-2:15 p.m. Presenter: Marge Geiger, Ph.D. Or do we do both? Poetry! Song! Are they different? Are they the same? Does one supersede the other? Let's find out. In these classes filled with rhythm and sound, we will explore the relationship between what we think of as a "poem" and what we label "song." From medieval ballads to American blues, from Beethoven to Bob Dylan, from Alfred Lord Tennyson to Wilfred Owen, we will discover that poetry/song lines are often inextricably combined. We will examine lesser known and more unusual religions in America that have evolved out of mainstream Christianity. This includes Christian Science, Seventh Day Adventists, Jehovah's Witnesses, Assemblies of God, and Mormons.

The Symphonies of Beethoven 9:30-10:45 a.m. Presenter: Richard Polster, Ph.D.

What makes Beethoven's symphonies so enjoyable to hear? Beethoven was and still is one of the most revered composers due to his symphonies. Each different. Each a classic. We'll take apart six of them and discover the genius of each.

Unknown Stories of America

11:00 a.m.-12:15 p.m. Presenter: Steven Schecter, M.A. Six different stories rarely discussed in the history books: George Washington and the Three Enslaved Patriots; The Mystery of Washington's Head Chef; Hercules and the Slave who Saved Washington's Possessions; Jefferson and the Hemmings Family: Did Jefferson father children from one of his slaves? Evidence will be presented. Jefferson's Monticello and the Jewish Family that Saved It; Monticello to Graceland: Jefferson and Elvis, Two American Icons: Visitors by the thousands go to these two houses. We compare/contrast. Two American Geniuses: Hamilton and Jefferson and the Caribbean: A look at Hamilton's youth in the Caribbean and a Hamilton comparison with Jefferson.

Adventures in Math, Part 2

12:30-1:45 p.m. Presenter: Carl Sieke, M.S.

In Part 1, we played mostly with whole numbers. In Part 2, there is still more fun ahead with such numbers, but we will expand our playground equipment to include negative numbers, fractions, and decimals (not the boring stuff from 4th grade). And finally, we'll learn about a type of number that feels like visiting another dimension, and the mysteries of infinity. As before, there will be connections to geometry. We'll run some interesting computer simulations, and explore impossible shapes, palindromic numbers, and magic squares. Part 1 is not a prerequisite, but curiosity is required.

Abraham and Moses in the Islamic Tradition 12:30-1:45 p.m. Presenter: Zeki Saritoprak, Ph.D.

Discover the profound significance of two pivotal figures in Islamic tradition, Abraham and Moses, through this captivating and enlightening course. Delving into their narratives, teachings, and enduring legacies, this course offers a comprehensive exploration of prophethood and the roles of these two Messengers of Allah within Islam, shedding light on their revered status and timeless relevance. Drawing upon primary Islamic sources, the course will explore in particular the stores of Abraham and Moses in the Holy Qur'an.
